Barings Emerging EMEA Opportunities PLC is an actively managed equity strategy. The Company's investment objective is to achieve capital growth, principally through investment in emerging and frontier equity securities listed or traded on Eastern European, Middle Eastern and African (EMEA) securities markets.

The Company aims to harness the long-term growth and income potential of Emerging EMEA. It is managed by one of the region's most experienced and best-resourced investment teams, using fundamental, bottom-up analysis.

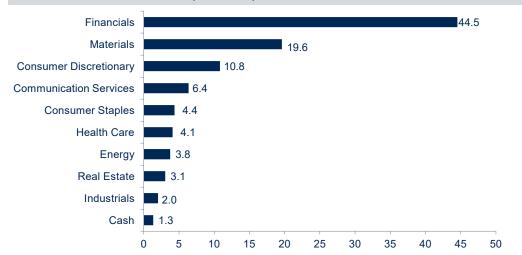

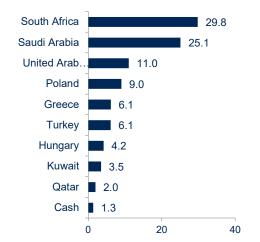

MANAGER'S COMMENTS SEPTEMBER 2025

PERFORMANCE SUMMARY

September 2025 marked a robust month for global equities, with major indices posting gains despite persistent macroeconomic uncertainties. The S&P 500 rose 3.5%, driven by strong earnings upgrades and resilient consumer spending. Technology and communication services led sector performance, while energy and materials lagged. Momentum and growth factors outperformed, and thematic portfolios such as blockchain and semiconductors surged. Precious metals, particularly platinum, were standout performers, rising 16% as investors sought safe havens amid trade and financial market volatility.

Against this backdrop, EMEA equities rose 5.6% in September, with the portfolio outperforming the benchmark by 1.9% (in USD). Relative performance was driven by allocation and security selection within the materials sector and through stock selection in the financials space.

In South Africa, the mining sector continued to fuel equity gains. Valterra Platinum delivered a strong performance, supported by elevated platinum group metal (PGM) prices and disciplined cost control. Management's mechanised operations helped keep costs under control and production growth remained on track. Gold Fields and AngloGold Ashanti also benefited from the global rally in gold prices. The company's copper acquisitions in Australia and Papua New Guinea are expected to reshape its portfolio over the next decade, reducing exposure to volatile domestic operations.

Polish names showed resilience with KGHM, the copper and silver producer, benefitting from rising commodity prices. Accordingly, our overweight positioning in these companies contributed significantly to relative returns.

In the consumer and tech space, Naspers, another overweight, saw renewed investor interest following Prosus's successful tender offer for Just Eat Takeaway.com. The deal, which led to a delisting from Euronext Amsterdam, narrowed the discount between Prosus and Tencent, prompting a rally in Naspers shares. The transaction reflects Prosus's strategic focus on consolidating its holdings and unlocking value, which in turn buoyed sentiment around Naspers.

In Saudi Arabia, reports of foreign ownership limit changes and the Capital Market Authority's (CMA) market liberalization proposals drove index returns. Our overweight positioning in stock market operator Tadawul, the banks - Al Rajhi and Saudi National bank - along with hospital operator Sulaiman Al Habib and miner, Maaden, all drove positive relative performance as they benefit from potential index flows.

Against this strong backdrop, our overweight in Turkish financial, Akbank, detracted from relative returns amid macroeconomic challenges. The Turkish banking sector continues to grapple with inflationary pressures and regulatory constraints, which have dampened investor enthusiasm. Our overweight in supermarket operator, BIM, and conglomerate Sabanci further weighed on performance from broader macroeconomic concerns.

Our overweight in Polish parcel operator, Inpost, also hindered performance as the shares sold off on the company downgrading its domestic volume growth as well as some uncertainty surrounding its Allegro partnership, whilst South African retail lender Capitec was down on profit taking - both being overweight positions.

STRATEGY

We remain focused on unrecognised growth, and we continue to seek out bottom-up investment opportunities where the future earnings potential is not fully reflected in the current share price.

In the short term, the EMEA region will remain connected to shifts in global sentiment regarding the direction of interest rates, the fight against inflation and global growth prospects, nevertheless, the EMEA region has a range of unique companies and drivers.

OUTLOOK

The resurgence of US isolationism under President Trump is expected to hurt the United States' long-term economic prospects and cause the asset rotation outside the US to continue. EM equities experienced inflows and we expect emerging EMEA equity markets to continue to benefit from the trend. These markets offer well-managed, attractively valued companies that have delivered shareholder value irrespective of the economic cycle over the medium to long term.

From a European perspective, nations such as Poland, and Greece display favourable growth potential, robust public finances, and a steadfast commitment to defence expenditures and military capability. These countries often benefit from a more stable political climate, that could be helped further with a Ukraine-Russia ceasefire, and an independent monetary policy framework.

The pace at which Turkey's rate of inflation declines will dictate the Central bank's interest rate policy which creates uncertainty over the outlook for the economy and Turkey's equity market, but recent political events are likely to be the more significant driver of sentiment.

The outlook for the GCC region continues to be clouded by the geopolitics and the volatility in the price of crude creating uncertainty around the pace of capital investments. Our focus will continue to be on researching and investing in companies with a compelling earnings profile that have a consistent track record in creating shareholder value regardless of the macroeconomic backdrop.

Finally, South Africa risk premium may no longer fall given disagreements between the ANC and the DA parties within the GNU coalition that could hinder any sustainable economic recovery.
